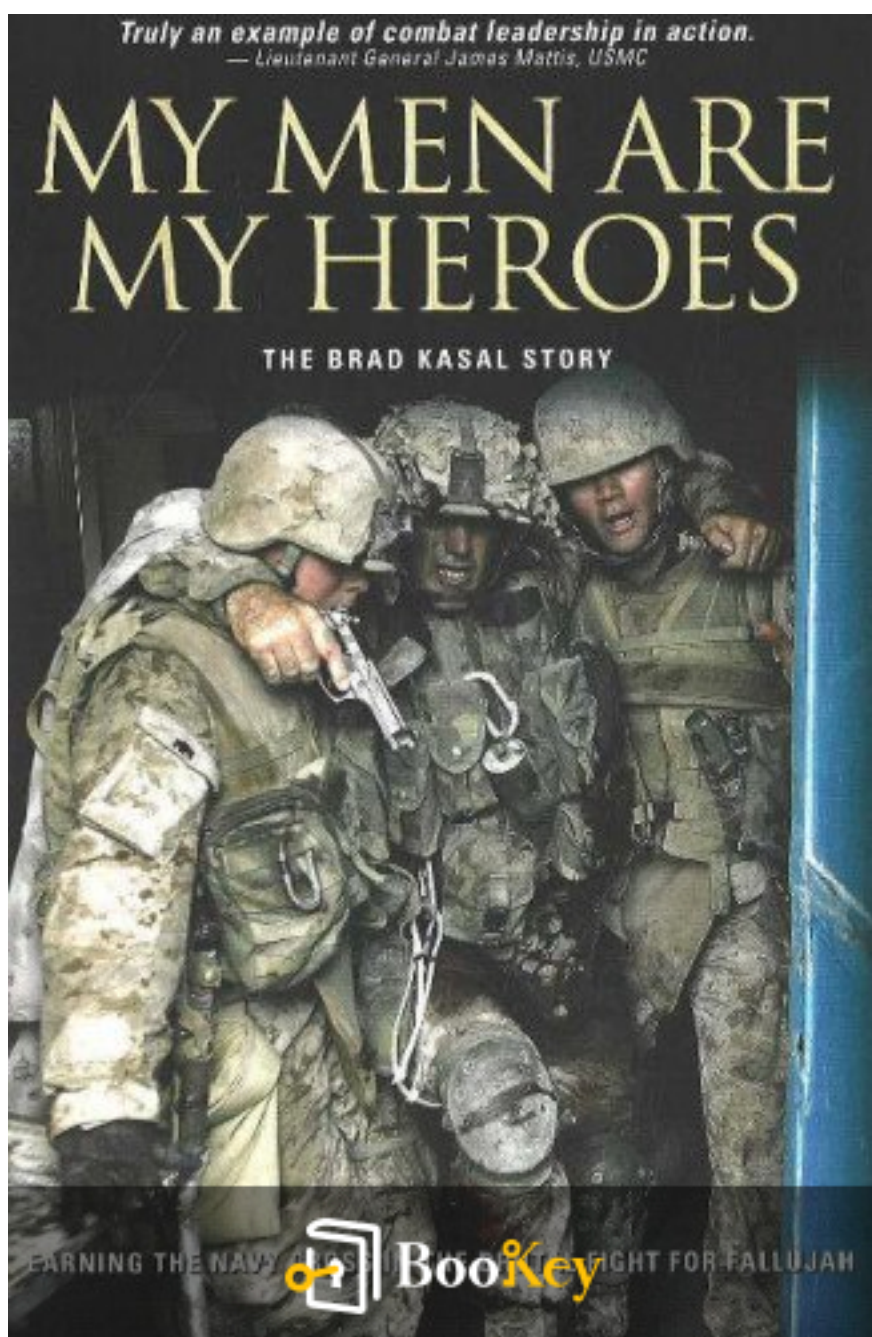

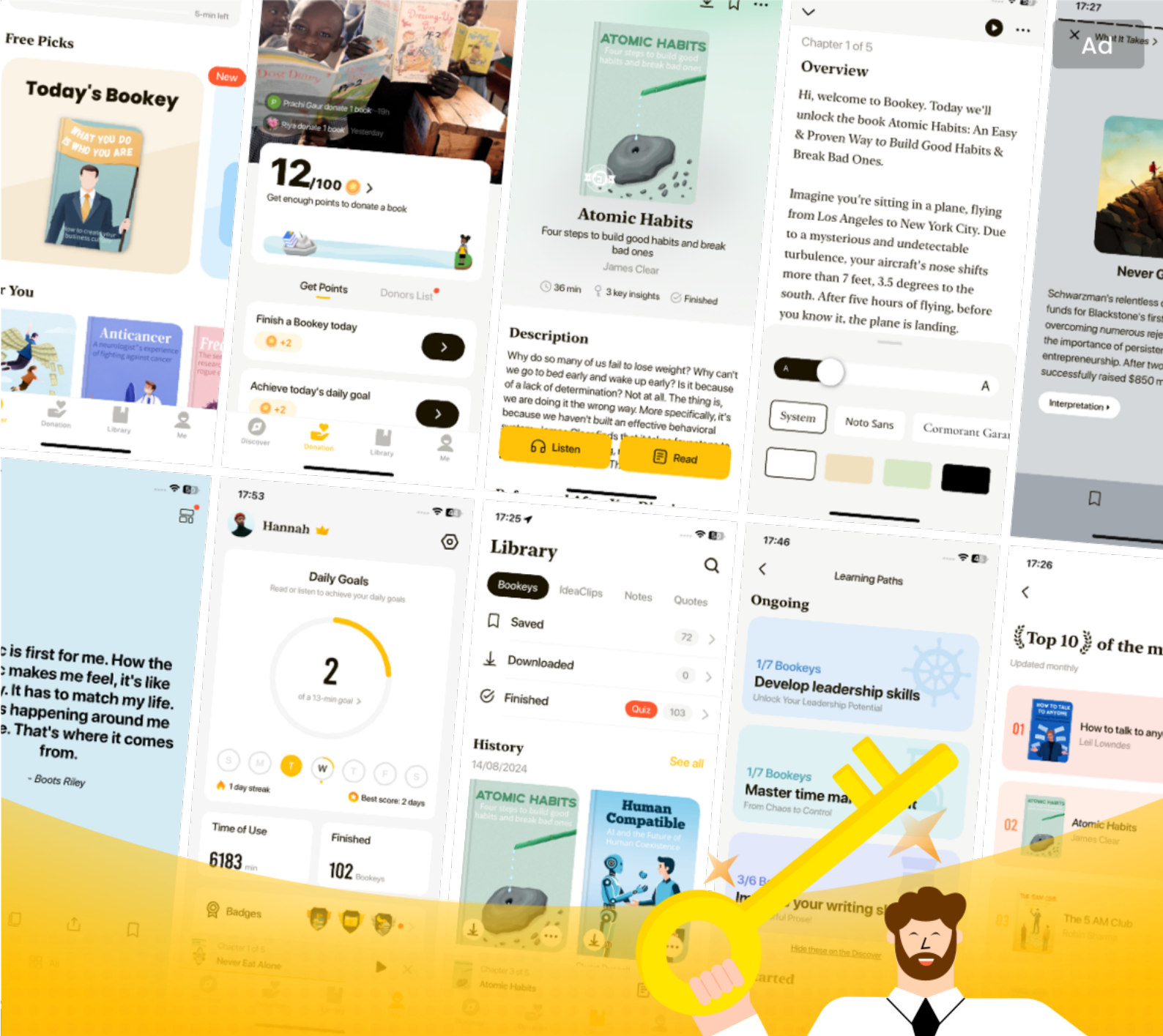
celebrate, still fixated on the absence of his battalion.
