



In a powerful speech delivered at the Houses of Parliament in London on April 23, 2019, Greta Thunberg, a 16-year-old climate activist from Sweden, passionately addressed the pressing issue of climate change on behalf of future generations. Greta, known for her vocal and unyielding stance on environmental matters, emphasized the urgency of immediate action to avert a catastrophic future.

Greta expressed concern that many dismiss the voices of young people as naïve or unimportant, despite the fact that they are echoing the conclusive warnings of climate scientists. She challenged policymakers to prioritize scientific evidence and take decisive action to secure a viable future for the next generations. Highlighting the timeline of climate projections, Greta warned of a probable point of no return by 2030 if substantial reductions in carbon emissions aren't achieved, noting the need for technology that has yet to be developed and acknowledging unpredictable factors that could accelerate climate change.

Despite having traveled across Europe to spread this urgent message, Greta lamented the lack of significant change in global behavior, pointing out the continued rise in emissions. She scrutinized the UK specifically, criticizing its misleading carbon accounting and ongoing support for fossil fuel industries. Greta argued that merely reducing emissions is insufficient;





instead, a full halt is necessary to keep global warming under control.

Greta criticized the complacency and reliance on the notion of 'lowering emissions' rather than achieving net-zero emissions and moving towards negative emissions. This, she claimed, perpetuates business-as-usual practices. She pointed to the exploitation of fossil fuels and infrastructural expansions as examples of detrimental policies not aligned with climate objectives.

Addressing claims that solutions to the climate crisis are absent, Greta conceded the complexity of the issue but stressed the need for unity in scientifically backed solutions and the concept of 'cathedral thinking'—building a future without knowing all the answers upfront. She urged for immediate action, arguing that the window of opportunity is closing rapidly and that humans must adapt swiftly to avert a crisis.

The speech underscored that this movement driven by youth is not for accolades or admiration but to awaken adults to the realities of a potential ecological disaster. Greta's message was clear: it is time for drastic and concerted global efforts to safeguard not just dreams and hopes but also the very existence of future generations. Her rhetorical question, "Is my microphone on?" underscored her plea for genuine listening and responsiveness from those in power.
