

Meanwhile, Ellie, emboldened by Henry's confrontation with her father, chose to follow her passion for design at the Edinburgh School of Art. She funded her education by selling some of her mother's less appealing jewelry, and despite numerous rejections, she and Cat found success with an indie publisher for their comedic children's vampire book series, drawing humor from their own experiences.

Freddie, having completed his military service, now thrives in a lucrative post in the private sector, though work commitments prevent his attendance at Cat and Henry's wedding. James Morland has made strides in immigration and human rights law and found love with a Somali restaurateur in York, adding to both his happiness and waistline.



In contrast, Bella Thorpe's brief stint on reality TV ended quickly, while her brother Johnny faced scandal and job loss due to financial misconduct.

These misfortunes, gleefully shared by Susie Allen, evoked a sense of schadenfreude, even within the community's moral leaders.

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
