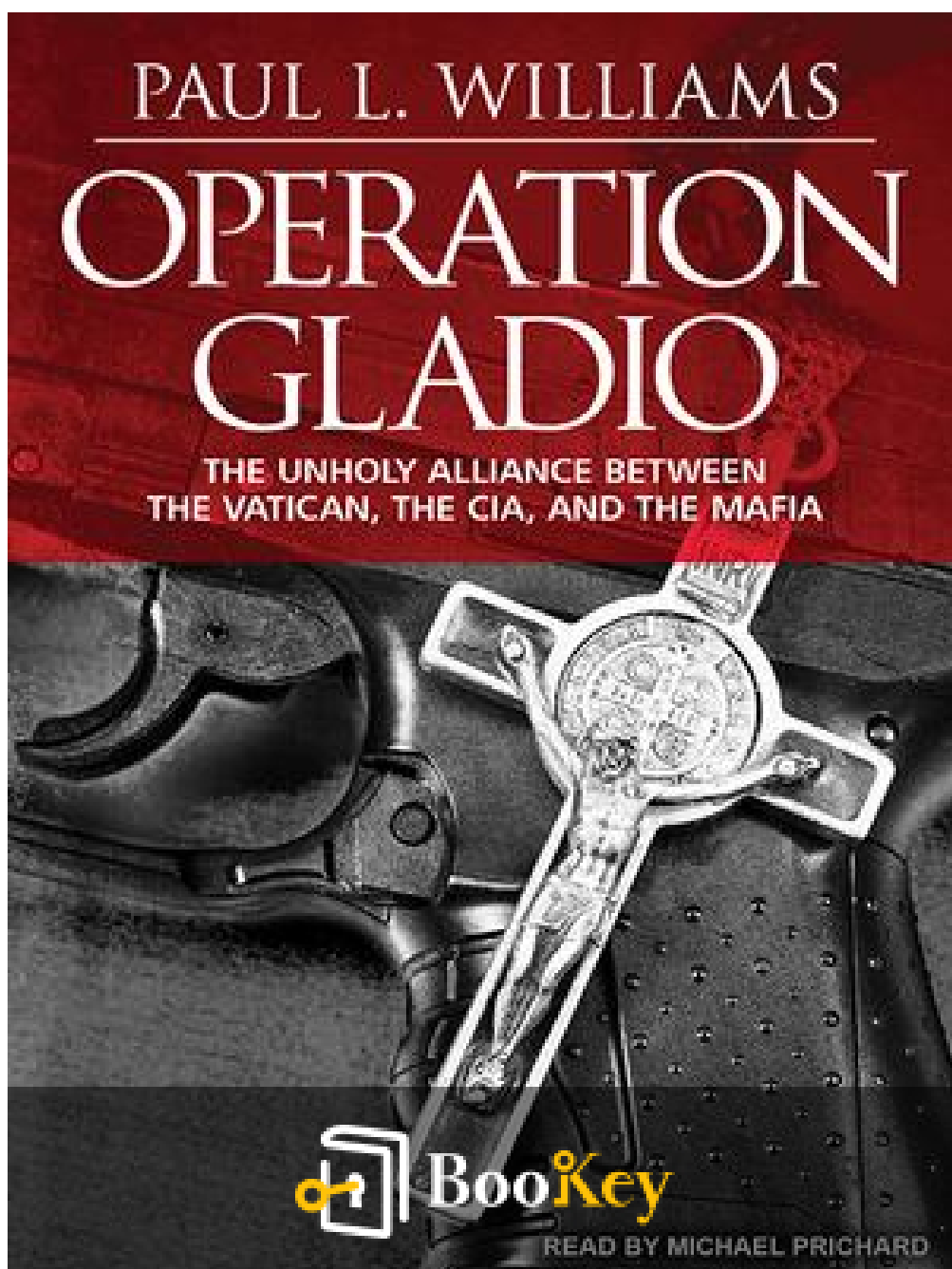

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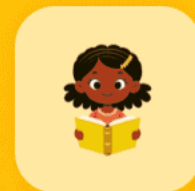

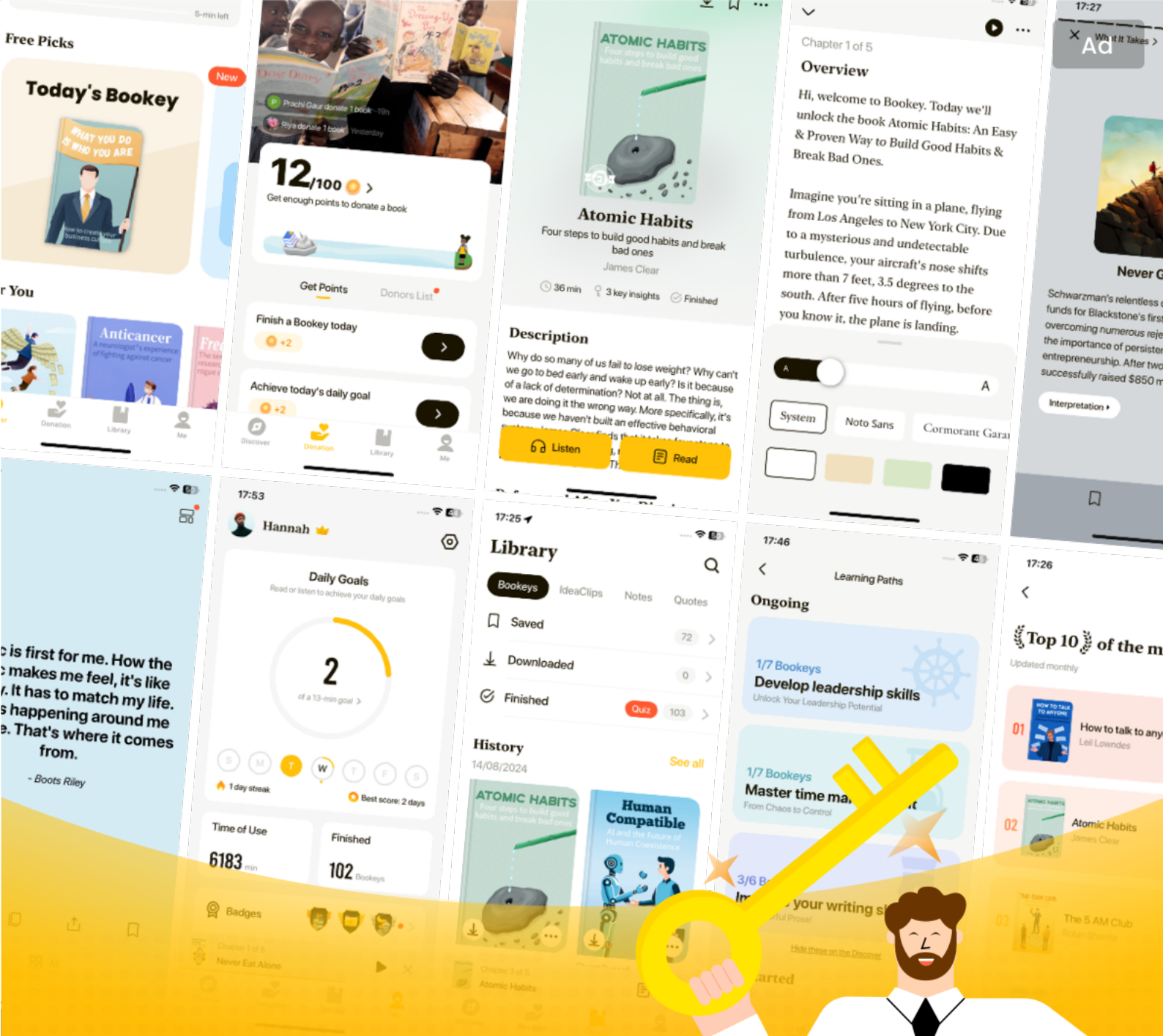

The interplay between the divine and the profane, encapsulated in the metaphor of Dante's dark wood, remains a poignant reminder of the struggle for integrity and



truth in institutions steeped in tradition and authority. The future of the Catholic Church, and its ability to navigate these profound challenges, hangs in a delicate balance, requiring both courageous leadership and a faithful following willing to seek a true path forward.

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
