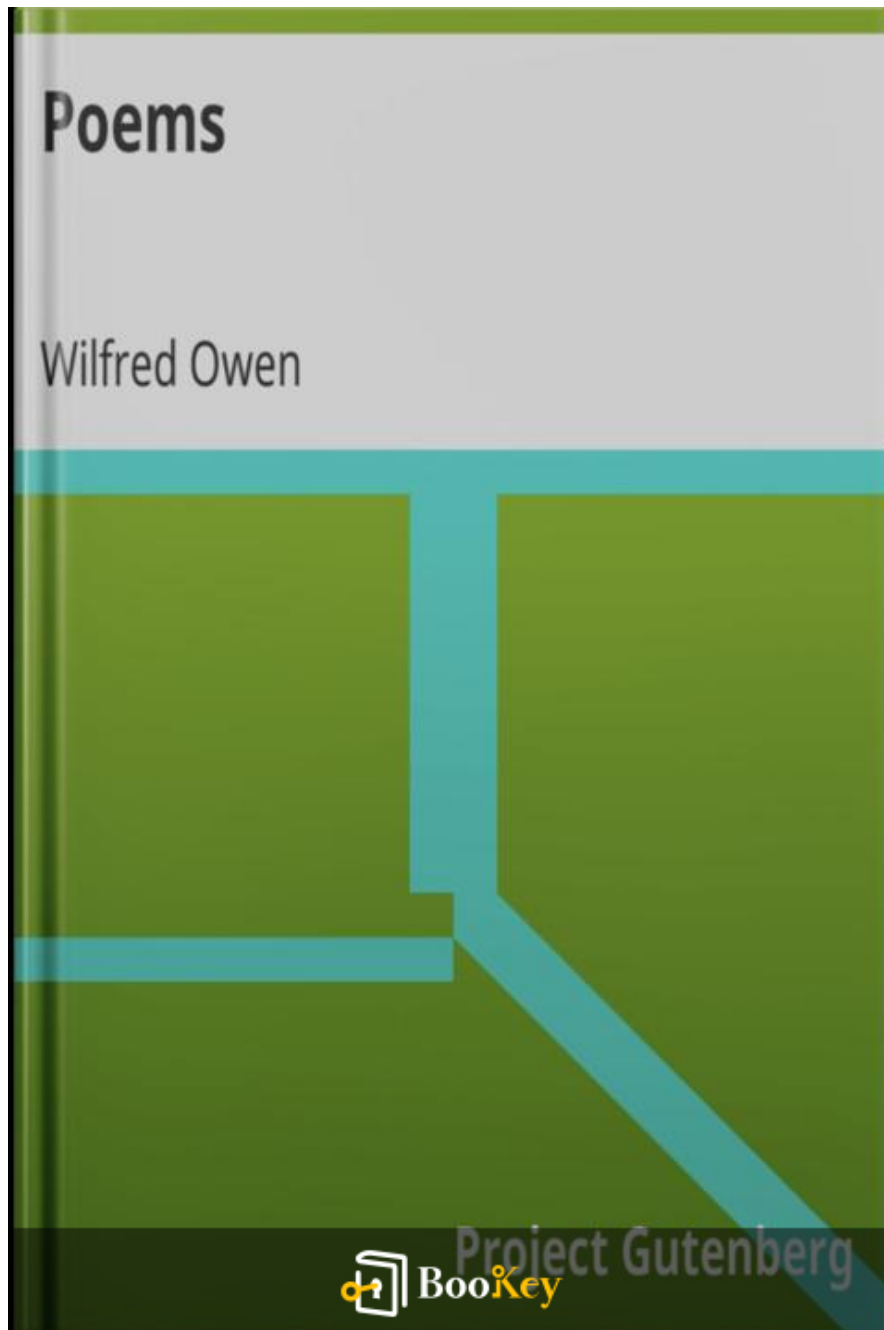

disdainful glances of women towards able-bodied men starkly emphasize his isolation and longing for connection.

As night falls, the speaker anxiously awaits assistance to settle into bed, a symbol of his profound need for care and the stark reality of his changed existence. The poem ends with a sense of overwhelming loss and a haunting question about the absence of those he once knew, leaving readers to ponder the true cost of war.
